THE LOGGER

Computer managed Amateur Radio log books are certainly a fine addition to your computer. I will start a series of columns describing one of these fine programs, "The Logger", created by Ladybug Systems, POB 57304 Webster, TX 77598. The cost is \$35.00.

This is a very sophisticated, disc based program for log book management for Amateur Radio Operators. It will store over 1,900 complete log book entries per disk.

This program requires an Apple II plus with 48K of memory, one disc drive and DOS 3.3 operating system. The program presumes the user is comfortable and familiar with the use of the Apple computer. The extract file requires a second disc drive. The output functions (printed reports, screen hard copy, and QSL related operations) require a parallel interface card and printer and an 80 column card. Some program modification is necessary if your computer lacks the above listed items.

The first thing to do when getting started is to make a back up copy of the program disc and have it handy for later use. Don't forget to delete

any 'hello' program from these disc's. The normal caution is expressed at this time to make frequent back up copies of the data base.

The program is placed in drive #1 and the user power boots the disc and the 'Logger's' hello panel will appear on the screen and remain on the screen while the main program is loaded.

The program disc has a small data base so that you can familiarize yourself with the 'Logger'. It is recommended that you use the 'FID' program to copy the following files; log data, config. data, and bit.map to another disc after familiarization. A fresh initialized disc should be used to begin your real data base. Before an initialized diskette can be used as a data base disc it must be initialized by the 'Logger'.

Once initialization is selected, the data base files bit.map and log.data are established without intervention. The program will signal the user when this process is complete. The user will then be prompted with two systems configuration questions regarding the availability of a printer and a second disc drive. The proper response to both questions is important for correct program execution after accepting the users inputs to both of these prompts, the program will create the data base file config.data.

In my column next month, I will describe how to add data to your new data base and what fields the system 'Logger' provides for.

Frequency List', for \$12.95, 'Special RTTY and CW Alphabets and Codes!, for \$12.95. 'Air and Meteo Code Manual' for \$15.95, 'Radioteletype Press Broadcasts', for \$12.95, 'Maritime Radio Handbook! for \$12.95 and 'Tune the Hidden Signals on Satellite TV' for \$12.95. All of the above require \$1.75 for postage and handling.

I have just returned from a great weekend in Louisiana and a super Hamfest hosted by the Acadiana Amateur Radio Association. This event was held in a very new Holidome facility located at Lafayette, Louisiana and is a "must go back next year" event. The members of the sponsoring group were the key to this years success with so much cordiality that I hated to leave. Also very present were members of the Acadiana DX Association, a very strong, devoted organization. It was my pleasure to meet two of their RTTY DXers, WD5ELJ - Jack, and W5HEZ-Jack. I feel that I gained some very valuable insight into the problems of today as well as those that face us as the Amateur population increases. Given a fixed set of rules. "cooperation" and "education" are the name of the game and it is my belief that we should work to that end.

"RTTY DX is easy, a snap, no problem"....or is it?

Not so very long ago, sitting here in the shack with a fellow Ham, I was tuning around the bands demonstrating the rig and ran upon a very popular ZK1 calling CQ. His signal was a good 599 and printing like a 2 meter local. Comments from the observer ran from: "gee this is amazing" to "give him a call, with a signal like that he can't help but hear you; man this is gonna' be like shooting fish in a barrel." The first call went out and when I stood by, I heard "de ZK1. ...". The usual return, signal report, name etc.. my visitor was all smiles and commented, "see how easy that is, man I have got to have a RTTY setup so I can work this kind of DX". The smile began to deteriorate into a frown when the station turned it back and the print read,

"W6.....de ZK1.....". What happened? We thought for sure that he had come back to us! Comments soon turned into unintelligible mumbles. I told my friend that we should listen the next time he stands by and see what the frequency looks like. We did and from the results of that not-so-casual peak, determined that my signal must have been somewhere between the tenth and eleventh layer of stations calling him. Wow! Where did all of those guys come from? This is not going to be easy at all! Eventually the station was worked but not before drawing some conclusions about RTTY DXing. This activity is a new ballgame and the rules that apply to CW and SSB do not necessarily work here. They also vary with the station that you are attempting to work. Some moves work better for some than others and through observation and experience one establishes an operating procedure that will work best for his effort. Needless to say, my friend and I have a deeper appreciation for RTTY DXing.

READER REPORTS: None received directly but Dee was very kind indeed to pass on to me, a heck of a nice report from Carl, K6WZ. I will cover the "highlights" of Carl's letter here and elsewhere in the following section. Our thanks go out to you and keep up the good work.

Ian, T2ITA, received a ROBOT from Tom, N4FJL, but now needs a stepdown transformer.


VK3KF, Eric, worked 3D2CJ in Fiji. Tom, N4FJL, hopes to go there and to Canton.



MSO'S

Hi Gang! Hope by the time this column hits the streets, that Old Man Winter is banished once again, and that your Winter was an easy one! This months column will delve into some of the "do's and don't's" of MSO operating, designed not so much to "lay down the law", but to make things a bit clearer in the remote users eyes. We'll start a new feature this month as well, the "MSO of the Month" portion, designed to acquaint you with some of the System Operators (SYSOP's).

MSO's have received some criticism in the past, (and most likely rightfully so), because some of them contained what was felt were 'business communications'. Specifically messages dealing with "For Sale", and "Wanted" items. Ham Radio has traditionally been categorized as "Amateur" radio, the communications of which are so unimportant that recourse to public (business) communications systems is not necessary. This definition is what has kept Amateur Radio free of competition with established communications businesses, whether they be radio, TV or the written word. Consequently, it is very important that we do not allow this competition to exist, whether it be MSO's, or any other mode within Amateur Radio. Businesses who derive their income from providing these very services will NOT allow Amateur Radio to challenge them in this area, and to press this issue can only have serious side effects for Ham Radio!

This author is the first to admit that the Federal Communications Commission has not directly addressed the issue of 'for sale' and 'wanted' items in MSO's. I'm also the very first to state that we should not FORCE the FCC into a position of rule

making in this area! We can only lose! However, a little research does provide some insight of the FCC's position in this general area. In a letter explaining that Section 97.112 prohibits "Swap and Shop" activity on Amateur nets, the FCC said:" A licensed Amateur could use his/her station from time to time to discuss the availability of a piece of their Amateur Radio equipment, but such activity would be limited to that of an occasional nature and could not include any items of a personal nature such as a camera, ordinary radios, etc., nor could this activity be conducted on a regularly scheduled basis". (This information was subsequently included in "League Lines", QST Magazine, Page 10, August 1974 issue).

This statement by the FCC appears to be the most pointed response to this question, and as far as this author knows, the most current. If anyone has any more recent official information concerning this subject, I'd greatly appreciate hearing about

Thhe operative words in the FCC's statement, "occasional nature", and "nor could these activities be conducted on a regularly scheduled basis", appear to this author to preclude using MSO's to list 'for sale' and 'wanted' items. It would appear that two Hams may quite legally discuss it occasionally, stick strictly to Ham radio equipment, and do not routinely schedule their discussions of these sales. But how does this apply to MSO's? After a lot of discussion concerning this subject, the MSO SYSOP's on the National Autostart Frequency, (14 085 625 Hz), have all decided not to tempt fate, and do not allow 'for sale' and 'wanted' items in their MSO's. Their rationale is that MSO's do appear regularly on the same frequency, and that

in the MSO's appear quite more frequently than on an "occasional nature", thus giving the appearance of "advertising". To demonstrate the extremes involved, this author is in receipt of a letter which complains that an automobile was listed 'for sale' in one of the MSO's on 40 meters! If true, that type of activity can only be detrimental to Ham Radio, and no matter what your personal judgement on this issue is, SYSOP's must continually monitor the activity on their systems, to preclude obviously illegal use!

1984 Dayton Hamvention. Ah yes, it is the season for the annual migration of thousands of Ham radio enthusiasts to Dayton, Ohio, to attend the Dayton Hamvention! We look forward to seeing all of our RTTY friends again this year, as well as 'twisting the knobs' on all of the new equipment proudly displayed by the various manufacturers. As in the past several years, the National Autostart Frequency, will again have a RTTY dinner. It will be hosted again by Gaylord and Louise Crawley (WB8ICL/WB8-JIB), and held at the Imperial House North, I-75 and Needmore Road on Saturday evening, April 28,1984. One and all are invited, with the proviso that seating space is quite limited, and anyone desiring to attend should leave a note in the WB8ICL or KOVKH MSO's, asking for a reservation. This dinner is strictly a social event, the vehicle for introductions, chitchat and hopefully, lasting friendships! be responsible for causing QRM to another station, and courtesy will pay handsome returns. Our communications to/from the MSO's are routine to the point that it's never so important to receive them, that it is necessary to QRM someone else. It only takes a little while to LISTEN on the frequency to make sure that your transmissions will not interfere with someone else, and only a very little more time to ASK if the frequency is in use. Let's ALL make it a habit to do our part in providing clear channel operating conditions for one and all, not just MSO users!

MSO OF THE MONTH. This month we feature one of the original MSO's on 20 meters. Gaylord, WB8ICL, and his lovely XYL Louise, WB8JIB, have maintained a very sophisticated MSO on the National Autostart Frequency for about four years now. Gaylord is a retired fire fighter, who also has hobbies of flying 'ultralight' and other fixed-wing aircraft, as well as camping and fishing in his new travel trailer. Look for him 'mobile RTTY' during the summer months!

They use a Radio Shack TRS-80, Model III, with a Crown ROM-116 Interface. and HAL ST-6000 demodulator. The HF equipment consists of a Kenwood TS-820S. crystal controlled, and a KLM KT34A beam antenna at 50 feet, but here's where the difference lies. Gaylord is utilizing RTTY software developed by Bob, WB4EJE, and further modified by Mike, WB4SGU, and himself to the extent that he has the most sophisticated MSO for the TRS-80 Model III, that I've ever seen. As well as having the normal MSO commands, the remote user can cause Gaylords MSO to change speeds, to relay buffer contents on a real-time basis. and to read and delete files on a 'mass basis', all features that are not available on other MSO's. Keep up the good work Gaylord, and I encourage others interested in using their TRS-80's in a MSO mode, to take a look at this machine!

We'd love to hear about MSO's,

automated RTTY systems, RBBS systems, computer related RTTY items, VHF or UHF RTTY systems, etc., in YOUR area! And we're more than happy to provide some exposure of these systems via the MSO column in the RTTY JOURNAL. 

RTTY TU CIRCUIT FOR THE SINCLAIR ZX81

This simple terminal unit for RTTY can be directly hooked up to the ZX81. There is a two position switch to allow for reverse but an additional position is strongly recommended in order to keep it from getting the tape straight while loading. The LED works well on 170 MHz shift as a tuning indicator. and will go out when the PLL is locked on frequency. Using a scope for tuning shifts greater than 425 MHz is advisable

Note that the 50k resistor is by the 50k resistor, ground is preferable 10 turns.



"The following circuit allows the use of FSK when using a Kenwood IS-180S and a Hal 2100 or HAL 2200 Terminal. Normally the HAL system uses AFSK and the lower sideband. With the 180S this prevents the use of the CW filters installed in the transciever. Using the circuit shown below the FSK mode can be used thus allowing the the use of CW filters and much better operation, especially during contests on 20 meters!"

From former RTIY JOURNAL editor, Mike Stone, WBOQCD comes the following information on a new 'Interfaceless' machine language software that copies and transmits 60 wpm Baudot on RTIY, on the IRS-80.

THe program is called 'COCORTIY' and is from Wapisware, POB H, Lowden, IA 52255 for \$24.95 (cassette) or \$29.95 on disk, plus \$1.58 for shipping and handling for either program.

This program requires NO INTERFACE (other than a single audio feed wire) Mike says. COCORTTY is a machine language program that actually copies (and transmits) standard 45.45 baud Baudot RTTY signals (68wpm) at 170 Hz. shift using a 2125Hz. mark and 2295Hz space signals. Once properly tuned, the RTTY data is regenerated into video display form and printed on your CRT! AS the RTTY information enters the COCO microprocessor, it scrolls in a right to left direction on the monitor up to a total of 32 easy to read characters. Total readable text message text is 16 lines by 32 characters per line for a maximum total of 512 characters displayed at any one time. Operation of COCORITY has been kept as simple as possible and a special basic language 'INSTRUC' (C) LOAD instruction program is provided at the beginning of the cassette version which is pretty unique in itself that tells the user about the special keyboard mode control command functions. Once the user has become familiar with this an additional MESSAGE GENERATOR (MSG GEN) program inserts up to a 38 character CW-ID memory buffer.A menu driven feature built-in allows the final formatted CW-ID callsign and buffered message generator info to be stored to another tape or disk eliminating going thru the INSTRUC or MSG GEN over and over.

Keep in mind that this is a low cost designed system trying to do what other expensive systems accomplish. It works well, is extremely simple to operate and allows another new mode of specialized communications in the Ham-shack at a budget price.

TRS-80 MODEL III BASIC PROGRAM FOR THE RECEPTION OF BAUDOT CODE.

If you have a Radio Shack TRS-80 Model III with RS-232 board, this simple BASIC program will let you receive 50 and 75 baud Baudot code. If you have a printer, you can also have a printed output of the received message.

If you want to receive 45 baud Baudot code, see my article in the November 1983 RTTY JOURNAL, for a simple modification of the Radio Shack RS-232 board.

This program uses the \$RSINIT and \$RSRCV ROM subroutines found only in the Model III. As these two subroutines are not included in the Model I level II ROM, this program cannot be used with this model.

You must feed a RS-232 level Baudot signal (+1- 3 to 15 volt) to pins 3and 7 of the RS-232 underside connector.

Here is a short explanation of the program:

Line 3: defines all variables as integers for maximum executing speed. Dimentions array A\$(X,B) to contain all letters (X=0) and all characters (X = 1)

Line 4: sets no parity, 5 bit word. 1 stop bit, parity off and transmit disable.

Line 5: sets wait for a character.

Line 6: calls \$RSINIT ROM subroutine.

Line 9: sets for 50 baud.

Line 10 to 42: defines array A\$(X,B) with the complete list of Baudot letters and characters.

Line 100: places the received Baudot decimal value in address P=16872.

Lines 120-130:flip flops the A\$(X,B) array between letters and characters.

Line 200: prints the character in the screen.

Line 300: when you press: "S": the message is only displayed on the screen.

"P": the message is also printed on paper.

"6": selects 32 characters per line.

"3": selects 32 characters per line.

"L": resets to letters.

'H': selects 75 baud.

"4": selects 50 baud.

Lines 1000 to 1020: line printer subroutine.
