

1st Place, Ricky Johnson, Lincoln, Neb. WAQCKY - "The Courtship"


2nd Place, Jim Ringland, Cincinnati, Oh. W8JIN - "Jaguar"



OPTO COUPLER FSK KEYER

DAVE CHAPMAN, W9DPV 670 N. Elizabeth LOMBARD, IL. 60148

This article describes an opto coupler frequency shift keyer offering several outstanding features:

1. Will work from either a 30 or 60 mill loop with no changes. (in fact is safe up to 80 ma.)

2. Insulation between the loop and keyed circuit is 500-2500 volts depending on opto isolator used.

3. In some conditions is selfpowered. (requires no power supply)

4. Will key at high speeds without dis-

5. May be connected in the loop in either polarity without damage and will operate properly.

6. Low cost

7. No mechanical adjustment required.

8. Electrically quiet.

Description:

The keyer in its simplest form consists of a bridge rectifier using 1N4004 diodes. These can be almost any silicon power diode.

The loop current is fed into the bridge and after rectification is fed to the light emitting diode section of the opto coupler.


The opto coupler can be the older Motorola MOC-1000 or a 4N26 or 4N27. The main difference being the isolation breakdown.

Sketch #1 would be applicable to an audio shifter as it would have the lower frequency under "mark" conditions. C2 might need to be increased to .01 or larger and under some conditions C3 will need increasing. R1 for audio service could run as low as 470 ohms. All resistors 1/2 watt.

The voltage at V1 in SK2 in one of my crystal oscillators was - 17 volts. The MPS3703 cut this off nicely and gave very clean RF keying. Note that SK-2 is an RF shifter with the mark high while the SK-1 is an audio shifter with the Mark low. C4 and R1 can be used as a shaping network to reduce "keying sideclatter" if carefully selected.

Conclusion:

This information will allow the reader to key his oscillator circuits directly from 170 volt machine loops with good results. It has been in use here for several vears.



A UNIVERSAL CLOCK FOR UART'S

Introduction

If you have been reading about the Asynchronous Receiver Universal Transmitter (UART), you are aware of the fact that this integrated circuit requires a clock input signal of 16 times the desired output or input baud rate. The other requirement for the clock is a minimum pulse width of 1 microsecond. The following clock circuit for UARTS is program-able in .5 microseconds steps, so literally any baud rate or printer speed can be selected.

The Circuit

The circuit consists of a crystal oscillator; a 12 bit binary counter; and a mono-stable vibrator. The crystal oscillator provides pulses to the counter at .5 microseconds intervals (2MHz crystal). When the binary count reaches 4096 decimal or 111,111,111,111 in binary, the next oscillator pulse causes a carry pulse to be emitted. The carry pulse is used to trigger the mono-stable vibrator (one shot). The timing resistor and capacitor are picked to give an output pulse width of approximately 8 microseconds.

The carry pulse is also used to preset into the counter the number the count is to

begin with. The time between output pulse is the time it takes to count from the preset value to 4096. The preset count can be set to any value from zero to 4096 with switches or jumper wires.

To figure out the preset count, calculate how many crystal oscillator periods are needed to give the UART period. So for 60 WPM, the baud rate is 45.45 x 16 equals 720 Hz. 720 Hz equals a period of 1,388 milliseconds. Dividing .5 microseconds into 1.388 milliseconds gives the required count of 2776 pulses.

The preset value is 4096-2772 or 1324. So, for 60 WPM the counter starts at 1324, counts 2772 crystal oscillator pulses to reach 4096, and then puts out a carry pulse. The carry pulses occur every 1.388 milliseconds or at a frequencv of 720 Hz.

The following table gives the preset counts for 60, 75, and 100 WPM speeds.


60 WPM - 45 bauds - preset count -1324 or 2454 octal

75 WPM - 56.88 bauds - preset count - 1900 or 3554 octal

100 WPM - 74.20 bauds - preset count - 2411 or 4553 octal

I have used jumpers to set the preset value. A series of 12 switches can be

used for speed selection. Or a 12 pole 3 position rotary switch can be connected to give 60, 75, and 100 WPM speed selection.



Modification of the Kenwood TS520 for use of CW filter on RTTY.

Owners of the Kenwood TS 520 who have tried to use the CW filter for receiving RTTY find that it will not pass the standart (2125 - 2295) tones.


The following simple modifications will make this equipment tranceive on 170 shift RTTY almost as though it was designed for it.

CARRIER BOARD , CUT ON BOARD BOTTOM VIEW (ADDED JUMPER)

None of the wires will have to be disconnected. Gently pull the board up and turn it over 120 degrees so that the bottom (wiring side) is accessible. With a razor blade cut the single foil lead where shown in the drawing. Make sure the foil is severed. This removes the original crystal (X1) and trimmer (TC1) from the CW diode switches (CWR & CWT) D 2 & D1.

Solder a jumper as shown in the same drawing using a piece of insulated wire. This jumper connects the CW diodes to the bottom of the lower sideband crystal (X3) at the Junction point of C1 and X3 TC3. This turns on the LSB crystal in the CW position of the mode switch.

On the component side of the board, locate the trimmer next to the CW crystal (TC1). Adjacent to the carrier board, near the CW trimmer, you will find a 3 point terminal strip with only one tie point being presently used. The unused terminals are used along with the hot side of TC1 to wire in the FSK components. (Note: that one of these ties is already grounded).



The modifications are easily made on only one board, the carrier board (X50-00901) located on the bottom of the TS 520. You have to be able to get to the both sides of this board. This means removing the four Phillips head screws in the corners that hold the board in place.

A relay was added (externally) as shown, to ground the FSK input on receive to prevent FSKing the received

Interpreting RTTY Weather Data.

EXTREME TEMPERATURE GROUP -- 4TxTxTnTn

44428 -- This indicates a high temperature of 44 degrees and a low temperature of 28 degrees. Note that these temperatures are reported in Fahrenheit for stations in the continental U.S.

The maximum temperature for the previous 24 hours is reported at 0600GMT. The maximum for the previous calendar day is reported at 1200GMT. At 1800 and 0000GMT the maximum for the previous 12 hours is given.

The minimum temperature for the previous 24 hours is reported at 0600 and 1800GMT. The minimum for the previous 12 hours is reported at 1200GMT. The minimum for previous 18 hours is given at 0000GMT.

When the temperature is higher than 100 degrees F., the amount over 100 degrees is sent. If it is lower than zero degrees F., the absolute value of the minus temperature is subtracted from 100 and this amount reported. Thus minus 15 degrees F. would be sent as 85. Zero degrees is coded as 00. Minus one degree would be 99.

SPECIAL PHENOMENA GROUP --

9SpSpspsp The 9 of this group is the indicator and the second and third digits, SpSp, specify the type of special phenomena. The fourth and fifth digits, spsp, give further information on this phenomena. A wide variety of events can be covered with this group, and it is sent whenever conditions warrant. Special phenomena generally considered of value are: direction and speed of maximum wind during the preceding 6 hours provided the wind speed equals or exceeds 33 knots, or is higher than some speed which is appropriate for the particular station. Detailed information on blizzards, hurricanes, and severe local storms including tornados. Pronounced variations in wind direction, wind speed, visibility, barometric pressure and the occurrences of frost, and frontal passages. Cloud directions when a hurricane is in progress within approximately a 500 mile radius

The special group to give the total accumulation of snow on the ground (904--) was covered above. Also, to be included in the report is a special group for the depth of newly fallen snow (901--) whenever one inch or more has accumulated on the ground during the past 6

hours. This group gives the total amount that has fallen prior to melting. That is if there were two accumulations of say one inch and three inches, the amount reported would be four inches even though part of each snowfall had melted at the time of observation.

There is a special phenomena group, 907-- which is sent when freezing conditions at the station are present. It gives the average rate of accrual per hour of glaze. For example the report 90702 would indicate an average rate of 0.2 inches per hour. This report is always sent when this freezing is occurring at the time of observation or has occurred during the past 6 hours.

For further details on other special phenomena and their code numbers refer to Federal Meteorological Handbook No. 2.

OTHER SUPPLEMENTARY GROUPS

The group 3PwPwHwHw gives the period and height of wind waves at ocean locations. The periods are coded directly in seconds and the heights in increments of one and one half feet.

The group dwdwPwHwHw gives the direction, period and height of swell waves.

The group 8NsChshs is for cloud layer(s). This reports the amount of sky coverage of a particular cloud type, C, and gives the height of these clouds. As many groups as necessary might be sent to describe various ascending layers.

RECORD TEMPERATURES

If a temperature extreme record is broken or equalled at a station with adequate records to report it, this fact is reported with a plain language contraction immediately following the 4TxTxTnTn group. These contractions are as follows:

HIXAT -- Highest exceeded for all time

LOXAT -- Lowest exceeded for all time

HIEAT -- Highest equaled for all time

LOEAT -- Lowest equaled for all

HIXFM -- Highest exceeded for the month

LOXFM -- Lowest exceeded for the month

HIEFM -- Highest equaled for the month

LOEFM -- Lowest equaled for the month

Spring Temperatures

HIXSE -- Highest exceeded so early LOXSL -- Lowest exceeded so late HIESE -- Highest equaled so early

LOESL -- Lowest equal

LOESL -- Lowest equaled so late

Autumn Temperatures

HIXSL -- Highest exceeded so late LOXSE -- Lowest exceeded so early HIESL -- Highest equaled so late

LOESE -- Lowest equaled so early

CITY TEMPERATURES

Some larger cities include downtown temperatures and conditions in the reports over and above the data from the normal weather reporting station. This additional report takes the form CITY TxTx TnTn TT R24R24R24R24. It gives the maximum, minimum and present temperature for the downtown location as well as the 24 hour precipitation figure if appropriate. The above nomenclature for temperature records applies to the data also, with city records being used for the analysis.

With the information so far presented available, you can obtain a fairly accurate weather picture for the entire U.S. by printing WSY70 and WBR70. At present their transmission schedules seem to be such that the synoptic surface data from WSY70 is delayed from WBR70. This allows copy on both reports with one printer and receiver. As noted, the coverage and completeness of data from the two complement each other giving a great deal of information for a preceding six hour period.

It is interesting to make some sort of weather map drawing isobars from the PPPTT grouped along with the temperature readings, and wind directions and speeds. Weather patterns can be followed at six hour intervals. Then you can note how this data compares with forecasts in the newspapers and on TV, and formulate your own forecasts.

TIDE INFORMATION

On the primary synoptic report from WBR70 there is often included tide data for coastal stations. This might print out at the end of the message as TIDE HW 005 or maybe TIDE LW 002. This indicates the deviation of the tide from the normal level for the hourly tide curve. The reading is taken one hour before the normal weather observation times of 0000, 0600, 1200 and 1800. If the time

We've got a load of VHF operating information again, this month. Glad to have it all. Please keep the news coming!

Rich Tashner, WB2TCC, secretary of the Tu-Boro Radio Club, sent the following comments and information: "In the December RTTY Journal our members read that there were a number of stations operating VHF FM RTTY on 146.550 MHz and commented that there was a lack of RTTY in the New York City area. We wish to correct this error.

Any station working 5 or more members of the Tu-Boro Radio Club will receive a worked 5 members certificate suitable for framing. Contest time is from 8AM to 8PM EST."

Barry Simpson, WA7HJR, in Tacoma, WA, has some interesting information: "Just a note to let you know that there are several of us currently active on 146.700 MHz FM simplex using 2125 Hz Mark/2295 Hz Space. All are set up to receive autostart 24 hours per day, and would welcome anyone who would like to join us on 170 Hz shift. Steve Phillips, WA6TVA, has an update on the Costa Mesa, CA, repeater situation: "Shortly after my letter appeared in your column several months ago about the WR6ACA Los Angeles RTTY Repeater, we lost the repeater site and part of the repeater when vandals destroyed much of the commerical equipment that was located at the same site. After being off the air for nearly three months, we moved to a new site northeast of the San Fernando Valley, repaired the damage, and kluged up another TU out of one of the commercial "onechip" moderns.

"Unfortunately, the new site is not as good for locations east of Los Angeles, but San Diego and Ventura Counties now have fair coverage. With the recent addition of a new Super Stationmaster antenna, commerical hardline coax, and a North Shores Duplexer, the situation has been improved a great deal, but is still not ideal. All this improvement has been a direct result of formally organizing the Southern Counties Amateur Teleprinters Society, establishing dues, and purchasing the needed equipment. Work is now in progress by a group in Ventura County (W6PNM, WA6SSN, and WA6BIV) in converting a Motran for use by the RTTY repeater. The new system, including a new TU and control system (a la WA6 SSN), is expected to be finished and installed by 1976 MAR. This will undoubtedly give very solid communications over a two hundred mile span from San Diego up to Santa Barbara as well as Los An-

Paul Rinaldo, K4YKB, sent several items for publication, mainly for next month's column, but one item needs mentioning now. The 1976 ARRL Mobile Communications Technical Symposium will be held 1976 MAR 24, 7:30 PM at the IEEE Vehicular Conference, Statler Hilton Hotel, 16th & K Streets, NW, Washington, DC. "This symposium, coordinated by the Amateur Radio Research and Development Corporation (AMRAD), will cover: Land Mobile to Satellite Communications. Close (frequency) Spaced VHF Repeaters, Automatic (CW) Identification and Controls Techniques, and other interesting related topics.' More information can be obtained from NOVARC, P.O. Box 682, McLean, VA 22101.

Dave Chapman, W9DPY es WB8QKU, has some interesting observations from the Chicago area: "Regarding the VHF Column in RTTY for 1976 JAN, there was a comment by W90EQ of Mokena regarding the lack of activity on 144 MHz. There is definitely a lack of activity but it is not due to Selcals as there are only three stations using Selcals that I know of in the entire area. The whole two meter picture is fragmented to such an extent that operation is almost nonexistent.

"Originally, there were several stations on two meter AM AFSK back in the 50's. Then as FM became readily available, most of the fellows moved to 146.700 MHz, standard shift, 60 WPM. It was no unusual to find half a dozen stations on in an hour. The first bad thing, the RACES services started up on 147.06 MHz, narrow shift - a very bad choice particularly for two meters - and this meant usually two machines and two terminal units. And with weather machines in several hundred schools, the service they offered was valuable. This fragmented the operation.

"Now in the last couple of years, the Milwaukee RTTY repeater is running narrow shift on 146.700 MHz and wipes out the whole north area of Chicago. This is particularly bad when a couple of fellows in Great Lakes who are only a few blocks apart insist on using the repeater for long contacts. The other thing that has helped kill operation is a repeater in Westchester, a voice repeater that has a terrible lot of spurious radiation and, while not right on 146.700 HMz, when some mobiles are using the repeater, the thing has components 20-30 kHz from the main carrier, making the west and southwest sections of Chicago unusable to marginal RTTY signals. In addition to this, another group has turned up on 147.900 MHz at 100 spped, again fragmenting the operation.

"With this as a picture, it seems to me that the future of VHG RTTY on two meters, particularly, is not very bright. The problem is - how to get everyone on one standard, and, in general, to use one frequency so a reasonable number of contacts will be available. ...Possibly these comments will throw some light on the problem and serve to get the fellows together a little more."

If we may, we would like to insert here a few words about "odd" shifts and machine speeds. DL8VX has word that the boys with the UN in YK land have declined to do any further operating on RTTY in the amateur bands. It seems that in almost every QSO they were told they were using the "wrong speed and shift", in this instance 425 or 850 hz shift and 50 baud speed. It might well to keep in mind that the shift and speed we use as amateurs is "odd" to them since most of this rare dx comes from either military or commercial or wx station facilities and their equipment is set up for standard international RTTY, in most instances the shift is inverted (to us) also. So it may be well not to scare off this rare dx but better to try to accommodate to their practice. which is extremely easy to do.
