Hello. I'm Bill Henry, K9GWT. I'm the new owner of the magazine we've all read and enjoyed for almost 50 years. Many of you know me as the president of HAL Communications Corp. - and - a once-in-a-while RTTY operator. While I have written an article or two and have been associated with RTTY for 35-40 years, publishing is new to me. So, I ask for your patience - and especially your comments and ideas. By the way, I'm calling the magazine *The* New RTTY Journal

This magazine has a long and very illustrious history. RTTY started in 1953 as the newsletter of the Southern California Radio Teletype Society. Editor Merrill Swan (W6AEE) managed the rapidly growing hobby and technology for 14 years. In 1967, Dusty Dunn (W8CQ) moved the RTTY Journal to Michigan and also started the gatherings of RTTY folk at the Dayton Hamvention. Don Crumpton (W6KCW) and then Dee Crumpton (N6ELP) were the next owners, moving the RTTY Journal back to California. Dale Sinner (W6IWO) picked up the reins in 1986 and served until the magazine was sold to the ADRS in 1994. Reflecting changes in technology, the name of our magazine evolved during Dale's tenure from RTTY Journal to RTTY Digital Journal to Digital RTTY Journal to finally the Digital Journal. The society also changed its name in 1995 to the IDRA (International Digital Radio Association). Jim Mortensen (N2HOS) was the publisher and editor for the IDRA. Unfortunately, due to various problems, the financial health of the IDRA declined suddenly in 1996 and January, 1997 was the last issue of our magazine, ending a 45 year long streak of un-broken publication. The ownership of the defunct publication reverted to Dale Sinner and I purchased the assets of the magazine from Dale

My plans for The New RTTY Journal are to continue publication in some form. However, I do not want the magazine to fail again and I must therefore learn from past problems. Conditions have changed considerably from the boom days of the 1980's and early 1990's. Some important 1998 issues are:

1. The Internet. It's here to stay and its presence has definitely affected the RTTY hobby and the fortunes of the magazine. DX and contesting has always been a strong feature of the RTTY Journal. In recent years, approximately half of the pages were devoted to DX articles, contest announcements, and contest results. Now we have the Internet and DX/contest reflectors. These things are fantastic. Reports of DX activity are

made "real-time" - as QSO's are made. Contest | nal was dominated by discussion of commerrules are posted when received; contest results start appearing within minutes after the end of a contest. This is a wonderful addition to the hobby and there is NO WAY that a printed periodical can compete. However, the Internet really does not provide permanent records of contest results, rules, or reports. You could print (or digitally store) this information, but try and find the one article of interest several months later - Good Luck! On the other hand, all 45 years of the RTTY Journal sit on a 5 ft. long shelf and it takes only a few minutes to finger-scan a year's issues. AND - all the photos and diagrams are right there. I contend that we RTTY types need BOTH the Internet and The New RTTY

2. Money: There's no two ways about it, printing and distributing a magazine costs money. If you don't collect enough money from somewhere, you can't keep printing. There are generally two sources of income in a magazine - subscriptions paid by the reader, and advertising fees from commercial firms. Many issues affected the financial fortunes of the RTTY Journal over the last few years. First, the Internet and low sunspots decreased the number of subscribers. Second, a recession in the amateur radio industry caused several advertisers to cut back or drop advertising. Some firms are now out of business. Third, paper costs more than doubled in 1996. Paper cost has since decreased somewhat but not back to early 1990's levels. Fourth, postage costs continue to escalate. I'm old enough to remember the 3 cent stamp and twice per day deliveries. Letters cost \$0.32 now and we get one delivery per day - on a good day. At the same time that all of these negative financial changes were happening, our magazine grew in size (and cost) and we RTTY hobbyists decided to bicker and split ourselves between two organizations (ADRS and IDRA).

3. Interests: Our hobby interests have changed over the years. During Merrill Swan's time, the magazine concentrated on how to make mechanical machines work, new terminal unit (TU) designs, and operating, particularly DX and contests. This continued during Dusty's time but new digital stuff started appearing. Personal computers and bulletin board operations became the "hot" topics during Dee's time and interest in old TTY machines all but faded away. IBM-compatible PC's and software were major interests for Dale's magazine. Build-it-yourself articles became fewer and fewer during the 1980's and 90's. By the time of the ADRS/IDRA, the emphasis of the Digital Jour-

cially available software and DX and contest operation. As I noted above, much of the DX and contest reporting has now moved to Internet reflectors. If the new magazine is to survive, I must find something to print that is of interest to all of you!

These are the problems and challenges. I've done a lot of thinking about it and have a few

- 1. Let's try for a "leaner" (but not "meaner") magazine - less pages and fewer issues per year for now. I'll keep subscription prices down. How about four 16-page issues per year as a
- 2. Use the Internet, It's "free" and fast, But, give me copies of permanent data such as contest rules, results, and awards.
- 3. I need pictures. Looking back at 45 years of the RTTY Journal, photos are a very interesting part to me. It's great to see what you looked like years ago - when you had hair - or when it wasn't gray - and see the old RTTY machine and TU you used.
- 4. Is anyone doing construction anymore? If so, don't be bashful. We all like to read about new gadgets, even if we never do it ourselves.
- 5. "Hints and Kinks" problem solving is still needed and I can provide a printed permanent
- 6. I'm pleased and surprised to see a resurgence of interest on the Internet in mechanical machines. How about some articles about "steam
- 7. How about some humor? We used to have some cartoonists in RTTY. Any of you guys still around?
- 8. I do not intend to align the magazine with any group. Hobby clubs are fun but it always comes down to a few people doing the work - and lot of people complaining. If I do the work, I'm "King". If you want to do the work, I'll make you "King" and I'll be the "Varlet".
- 9. I will accept advertising and solicit new product announcement from all who are interested.
- 10. I will have a few columns but I'd prefer to have a good mix of different authors in each issue.

#### Future Plans

- 1. This short issue is the first step in the recovery of the The New RTTY Journal. I hope to start regular printing this summer. I'm still working on details - what to print, subscription prices, ad fees, etc. I should have more definite information at Dayton.
- 2. The New RTTY Journal will continue sponsoring the CQ/RTTY Journal Sweepstakes DX Contest in the fall and the RTTY Journal WPX Contest in the winter. We could also participate in others if there is interest.
- 3. We will continue to sponsor activities at the Dayton Hamvention - room reservations, ban-quets, forum, and hospitality suite. As you will discover when reading the rest of this issue, this year's festivities are well under way. I also want to resume RTTY Journal support of West Coast meetings, starting with the San Diego Hamvention this August 14, 15, and 16. I am not sure that we can provide room reservations and banquets this time, but plan on a RTTY forum and hospitality suite at the minimum. I'd like to see this become an annual West coast affair at the Southwestern Division show in the fall.
- 4. Work continues on making a CD ROM recording of all back issues of the RTTY Journal. I will not have copies for sale at Dayton but should have some next fall. I've learned a lot about how to do it correctly!

Finally, a BIG thank you to my good friend Dale Sinner. Dale has agreed to come out retirement "one more time" and organize the Dayton gathering - and do booth duty for me as well. The editing of this magazine and most of the text you read in this issue is all Dale's work. Thanks, friend. Well, that's it for my column this issue. Look at the Dayton stuff and let's plan to meet at Dayton.




